Annual Meeting of North Carolina Association of Teachers of Mathematics

The annual meeting of North Carolina Association of teachers of mathematics will be held Friday and Saturday, February 22 and 23, at the North Carolina College for Women in Greensboro.

William Betz, vice-principal of the East High School of Rochester, N. Y., will be the chief speaker. Mr. Betz, said to be one of the greatest authorities on high school mathematics, is well known to teachers through his articles in the "Mathematic Teacher" and his courses in the teaching of mathematics in Columbia University.

The principal address by Mr. Betz will be at 8 o'clock on the evening of February 22, to be followed by a social meeting at 9:15. On February 23 there will be a business meeting at 9:30 in the morning, to be followed by an address by Mr. Betz at 10:30 and a round table discussion at 11:45.

Women who expect to attend the meeting will be furnished board free at the college dining hall and rooms will be secured for them in the immediate vicinity. It is necessary, however, that they send their names to Miss Nell Farrar at the North Carolina College for Women, Greensboro, N. C., not later than February 15.

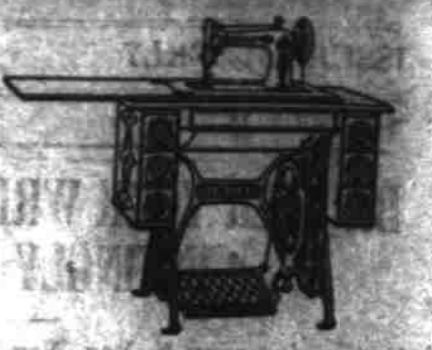
