**NOTICE OF SPECIAL SCHOOL
TAX ELECTION**

Trinity Township

Notice is hereby given that a special election has been called and will be held in the special school taxing district hereinafter described and defined, on Tuesday the 16th day of April, 1924, to determine the will of the qualified voters of said school district upon the question of levying and collecting in said district a special tax for schools, in addition to the county tax for the six months school term, in the amount of fifty cents (50c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all the property, real and personal, as the maximum rate of tax.

The Old High School Building in the Village of Trinity, N. C., shall be the polling place for said election, and H. M. Cranford has been appointed registrar, and Lee Andrews and Robert Blair have been appointed judges for said election.

A new registration of the qualified voters of said special school taxing district will be had for said election. The registration books shall be open for the registration of voters from the 13th day of March, to the 5th day of April, 1924, inclusive, Sundays excepted, and said registration books will be held open on all Saturdays, during the registration as above stated, at the polling place for said election as above stated. At said election those who are in favor of the levying and collection of said tax shall vote a ticket on which shall be written or printed the words "For local tax", and those who oppose shall vote a ticket on which shall be written or printed the words "Against local tax". Said election will be held under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 136 of the Public Laws of 1923 of North Carolina.

Said special school taxing district is described and defined as follows, to-wit:

All of Trinity Township, Randolph County, North Carolina, and comprising Trinity, Archdale, Caraway, Prospect and Miller School Districts.

All persons are required to take notice of the above and govern themselves accordingly.

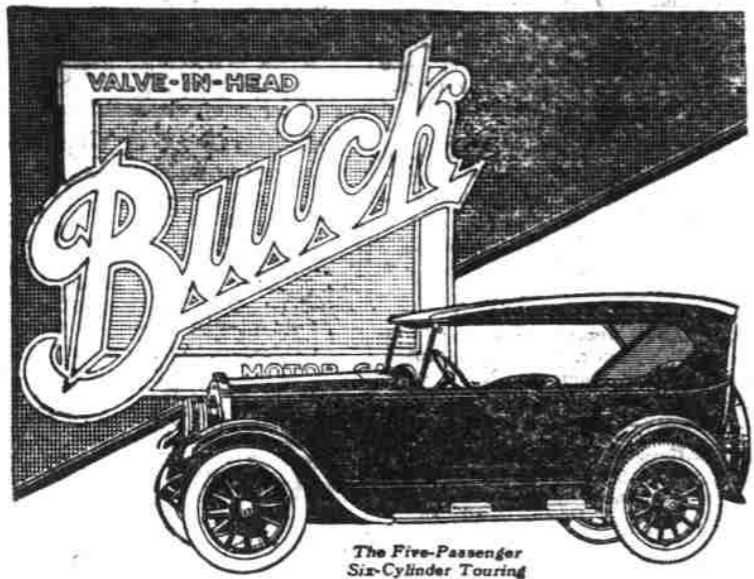
The county of Randolph has no prison camps. This county has a jail house, a splendid building closely attached to the splendid modern court house of Randolph county. The jail is kept in splendid condition, clean and sanitary with all necessary arrangements for bath and taking care of prisoners. The prisoners are in all particulars most comfortable. Nice clean comfortable sleeping apartments with plenty of cover, and are fed a well balanced and abundant diet, well cooked. I have also visited the county home of Randolph and all of the other counties. These institutions are like-wise a credit to the counties and to the state. The public spirited and patriotic officials of Randolph county stands ready to cooperate with, and to respond to the most progressive things of our age in the betterment and uplift of prison life. Indeed I am very happy to report in sincerity and in truth, and I do so herewith report that I find a spirit with the governing authorities, with the grand juries and with the people generally, to respond to the highest instinct of humanity in bettering our prison life.
