 The young as well as the older

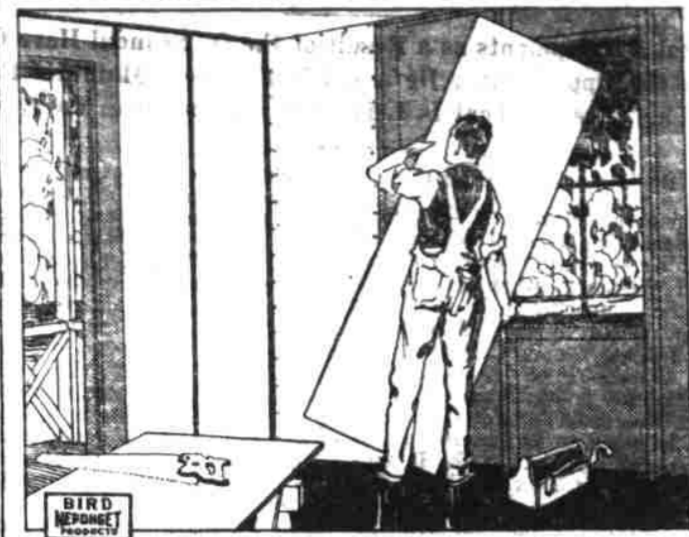
folks had a joyous time in selecting their escorts. Games and contests and refreshments made the evening pass very pleasantly for all.

 There are scrub fertilizers just as there are scrub cattle and the only advantage is a cheap purchase price, agronomy workers of the State College.

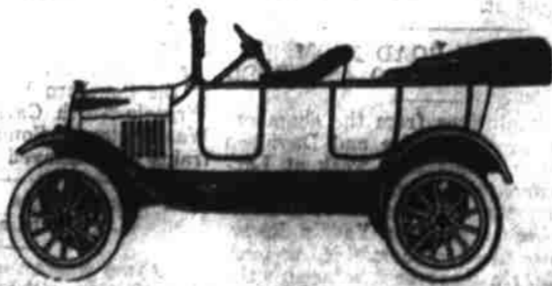
Eugene Parsons of Star Injured In Automobile Accident
