Congressmen Are Abused Because They Will Not Support the Mellon Bill.

(By Wallace Bassford.) Washington, D. C., March 4th.—The floods of mail received by Members of the House reveal a surprising state of ignorance in the country as to the real purpose and effect of the Mellon Bill. Many men of moderate income write to Congressmen and abuse them like pickpockets because they are not supporting the Mellon plan, seeming to think the Representatives are seeking to prevent a reduction of taxes. There seems to be little understanding that the Garner, or Democratic bill, makes such more substantial reductions for the average man, and that only the man with net taxable income above \$55,000 per year can secure as great relief from the Mellon plan. Under the Garner plan a married man with net income of \$3,000 and no dependents would pay no tax at all; under the Mellon plan he would pay \$15, whereas under the present law he would pay \$20. If the net income is \$5,000, the present law tax would be \$100, the Mellon tax \$75 and the Democratic tax \$40. If the income be \$10,000 the present law tax would be \$520, the Mellon tax \$380 and the Democratic tax \$240. These are fair samples. The married man with children gets an additional exemption under the Democratic plan of \$400 for each child under 18 years; the unmarried person gets an exemption of \$2,000. Under the Mellon plan this exemption is only \$1,000.

This lamentable ignorance makes men attack the Representative who is voting in the interests of practically every taxpayer in the land, is doubtless due almost wholly to the organized propaganda. Much of this comes from the nationwide canvass made by The Literary Digest, simply asking each citizen if he favored the Mellon plan for tax-reduction, without giving the voter the information that another plan proposed to give a much better and quicker reduction. The quicker is used for this reason: The Mellon bill provides that for the taxes for the year just past a refund shall be made by the Treasury of 25 per cent of the amount of the year's tax. When that refund will be made is something that requires a very fine sample of guessing. Just now the Treasury is more than four years behind with its work of auditing returns, and getting further behind all the time. In the case of many men now living their executors would have to collect the rebate, if paid before the day of final settlement of the estate. Under the Democratic plan it is proposed to arrange it so that the taxpayer can simply omit his fourth installment of taxes, due this next fall. For this reason it is well that all taxpayers should make their payments in four equal installments, as provided by existing law; before the last one is due the provision for the 25 per cent rebate will be in effect.

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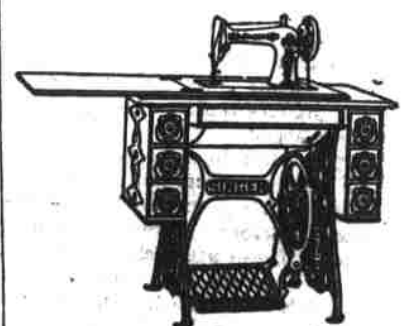
