WOOD AND STARNES CAPTURED AFTER THREE DAYS

C. H. Wood, known as "Otto" who killed A. W. Kaplan, a Greensboro pawnbroker several months ago, and J. H. Starnes, both escaped convicts from the State Penitentiary at Raleigh since Saturday morning were captured at Roanoke, Va., Monday night. Between Saturday and Monday night the story of the two men's deeds and movements is a long and exciting one.

Starting from Raleigh after escaping from the institution to which both had been sentenced, their flight into this section of Virginia was one in which the automobile played an important part. Stealing a truck a short distance outside of Raleigh they drove in the direction of Durham, abandoning the truck on the road and stealing the car of M. D. Cline, of Durham, whom they approached at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, jumping on the running board, thrusting revolvers in his side and compelling him to accompany them to Greensboro where they passed through the scene of the murder of A. W. Kaplan, for which Wood was sentenced to 30 years in the penitentiary. Cline was taken from the machine after Greensboro had been passed, and left in a clump of woods tied with his own belt. He was robbed of the money he had on his person and a gold watch.

The fugitives were next heard of at Schofield when the touring car in which the two were traveling rushed through that town at a terrific rate of speed. However, the muddy condition of the car obscured the license and the watching officers were unable to outdistance it.

From Winston-Salem, where the fugitives picked up Mrs. Wood and her five-year-old daughter, Mary Elizabeth, the automobile traveled all night in the direction of Roanoke, arriving about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon.

The muddy car attracted the attention of a policeman on the outskirts of the city, and he notified police headquarters. Seeing that they were followed, Wood, who was at the wheel of the car suddenly turned it into a field and the two fugitives darted off. Two hours later the two men were captured in the woods and taken without much resistance to the police station and will soon be sent to Raleigh again.
