COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION IN AUGUST

It is announced by officers of Randolph County Sunday School Association that the annual County Sunday School Convention will be held on Thursday and Friday, August 7 and 8, in the Methodist church, Asheboro.

Taking a prominent part in the program will be the following well known Sunday School workers: Miss Daisy Magee, Raleigh, Children's Division Superintendent North Carolina Sunday School Association, and Prof. J. B. Robertson, Supt. Cabarrus County Board of Education, Concord.

In addition to these outside speakers a number of the most prominent pastors and Sunday School workers in the county will take part in the various sessions of the convention.

In charge of the arrangements for the convention are Mr. H. B. Moore, and Miss Hester Patterson, President and Secretary of the County Sunday School Association. These officers are requesting the co-operation of all pastors, superintendents and other Sunday School leaders in the effort to make the convention a success.

Following a plan started at the county convention last year, the officers have announced that again this year a pennant will be presented to the Sunday School having present in the convention the largest number of representatives sixteen years of age and over, according to the number of miles traveled. The number of representatives from each Sunday School will be multiplied by the number of miles from that Church to the Convention Church, and the Sunday School having the largest total will receive the pennant. It is expected that there will be much friendly competition for the pennant among the Sunday Schools of the county. The Sunday school with which the convention is held, and others within one mile, will not compete for the pennant.

Complete returns of Saturday's second primary between Frank D. Grist and M. L. Shipman for nomination on democratic ticket for commissioner of labor and printing had not all reached Raleigh today. However, complete returns from 29 counties and incomplete returns from 27 others give Grist 45,198 votes and Shipman 23,357. Indications are that the ex-service man will be nominated by a majority of at least two to 1.

Big Wheat Record

Mr. T. D. Pope and David Young who operate the Welborn farm near Welcome in Davidson county have reported an excellent yield of wheat on a large acreage. They realized a yield of 2,206 bushels. Twelve acres of the crop averaged 38 bushels per acre.

The farm has been consistently improved by the use of lime and legumes. The farm is in the famous Jersey belt, perhaps the best wheat producing area of its size in the country.

Wilson G. Harvey, former governor of South Carolina and president of a bank in Charleston, was acquitted in court last Saturday of charges of violating the State banking laws in connection with the failure of his bank some months ago. It was charged specifically that he received deposits when he knew the bank was insolvent.

John W. Booker & Co., of Martinsville, Va., has begun suit against J. M. Fields, Randolph farmer living near the Guilford county line, asking judgment for \$378.80, alleging that the company purchased a quantity of seed peas and beans from Mr. Fields and that the goods were not shipped. The defendant sent the company check for the amount of the order but same was returned unpaid.

Governor Charles W. Bryan of Nebraska, the democratic vice-presidential nominee states that he has no intention of resigning his position. He states that such a step would be unusual and unnecessary. He will not, however, be a candidate for re-election to the governorship.
