At the extraordinary session of the legislature which adjourned last Saturday a joint commission of the house and senate was named to investigate penal institutions in the state.

The purpose of the committee is to investigate the treatment of prisoners by the superintendent of the State prison and his subordinates, and also the general management of the state's penal institutions.
