## TERM OF CRIMINAL COURT ADJOURNED

Dispose of Number of Cases on Crowded Docket—Grand Jury Makes Report.

The September term of Randolph County Superior Court adjourned Friday afternoon after having tried or disposed of a number of cases on the crowded docket.

All three murder cases were disposed of, Jake Wright pleading guilty of murder in the second degree for the killing of Hugh Phillips of Liberty, was sentenced to the State prison for a term of 8 to 12 years at hard labor. Sentence was at first 12 to 18 years, but was changed to figure as stated. Hurry layley, for the slaying of Emma Grisco, was convicted of murder in the second degree and sentenced to the State prison at hard labor for a term not less than 10 years and not more than 15 years. Raymond Johnson pleading guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to 90 days. H. O. Underwood was sentenced to jail for 30 days and taxed with the costs in the case. Herbert Rich plead guilty on a liquor charge and was fined \$25 and the costs and given a suspended sentence of 90 days, this road sentence not to take effect provided he let liquor alone for 5 years. Jim Black and Robert Black plead guilty on charge of violating the prohibition laws and the former was fined \$25 and half the costs in the action, and the latter a fine of \$50 and half the costs. Road sentences of four months for each defendant were imposed in the case. They do not take effect provided defendants neither drink, buy, possess, or have anything at all to do with whiskey for a period of 5 years. W. W. Watson plead guilty on charge of violating prohibition laws and was fined \$100 and the costs and given a suspended sentence of 6 months on the county roads, not to take effect provided Watson has nothing to do with liquor or allows it to be made on his land for a period of 10 years.

Mann York was found guilty of having in his possession property designed for the purpose of making liquor and was fined \$25 and costs, and put on good behavior for a period of 5 years. Oscar Mitchell plead guilty to possessing and receiving liquor and was fined \$50 and costs, and given a suspended road sentence of 12 months.

Lillie Brower was taxed with the costs in his case and was put on good behavior for 5 years. Grady Henson plead guilty to the indictment in his case and was ordered to pay W. O. York the sum of \$50 and was placed under \$200 bond for his appearance at each term of criminal court for a period of 12 months and show that he has been in good behavior. Thomas Henny plead guilty and was fined \$50 and costs and confined to jail for 10 days.

Glenn Butler plead guilty to false pretense and was sentenced to the State prison at hard labor for a term not less than 2 years and not more than 4 years. In another case involving a violation of the prohibition

The grand jury made the following report:

To his honor, Judge A. M. Stack, presiding:

We, the grand jury for the term, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have completed the business before our body and have returned all bills submitted to us for action, except those in which we could not secure witnesses some of them serving road sentences and the others having left the county.

We have examined all the institutions of the county in a body.

We visited and examined the county home in a body and found the buildings in good shape and all in a

## Grand Jury's Report (Continued)

We visited and examined all the offices in the court house and found them in excellent condition.

We recommended that good steel banisters be placed on the steps to the rear of the courthouse, and that one extra step be placed at each of the stairways.

We especially recommend that the public toilet in the basement of the court house be partitioned off separating the white and colored people, and that these toilets be kept in better condition.

We recommend that the plastering on the overhead ceiling in the County Superintendent's office be repaired.

We visited the jail in a body. We found 27 prisoners all of whom were well fed and properly cared for. Plastering has fallen from the overhead ceiling caused by a leak in the roof which has been repaired, and it is recommended that this plastering be replaced and that some much needed repair be done on the floors.

We recommend that the padding or upholstery for the cell for the insane be repaired.

We extend our appreciation to your honor, the solicitor and other officers of the court and county for the courteous treatment and consideration we have received.
