NUMBER STATE OFFICIALS DIED IN RECENT YEARS

With the death of William Walton Kitchin November 9th, the last of the ex-governors of North Carolina passed away. The only living man who ever occupied the governor's chair in this state is the present incumbent, Cameron Morrison.

Three former governors have died during the last four years. They were former governors Bickett, Lock Craig and Kitchin. Not only have three former governors died, but three members of the supreme court, three heads of state departments and three former department heads have died. They were Chief Justice Clark and Justices Allan and Walker; Secretary of State J. Bryan Grimes; Commissioner of Agriculture W. A. Graham and Dr. D. H. Hill, secretary of the Historical Commission and former state auditor W. P. Wood, former chairman of the Corporation commission Franklin D. McNeill and former Attorney General Gilmer.

Names Butler To Succeed Lodge

Governor Cox, of Massachusetts, has named William M. Butler, chairman of the Republican national executive committee, United States Senator to succeed Henry Cabot Lodge, deceased. The Democrats, it is understood, will challenge the governor's authority to make the appointment and will ask for an election to determine who shall be Lodge's successor.
