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The building and loan provides a safe place for the person who wishes to save systematically either in large or small amounts. North Carolina has a record of no building and loan failures since placed under supervision many years ago. The associations are economically run, the average in the State for the past four years has been one per cent a year on basis of assets.

A new series of building and loan has been opened by the People's Building and Loan Association of Asheboro. This association was organized and exists for the purpose of community benefit, not for the benefit of the few. All shareholders share alike whether rich or poor. The building and loan is the only institution in the State that gives the wage earner and salaried man the plan of repayment on easy weekly or monthly payments in the purchase of homes.

LIBRARY WEEK

In order to make the Asheboro school and A-1 grade it is necessary that a thousand volumes be added to the school library. Seven hundred of these books are required for the elementary department and three hundred for the high school. 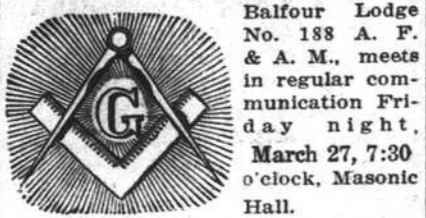
