At the age of sixteen he volunteered in the Confederate army, being assigned to Company I. 46th regiment. Remarkable it was that he served the four years and returned without a scar, but brought reminiscences which grew more vivid as the years passed.

Loyalty and friendship to his friends in declining health was manifest and his devotion to his family and his church were indeed beautiful Happiness was written upon his face and consideration of his fellowman characterized his every day life. Plain, practical and true was W. S. walked by his side for fifty-seven years and two daughters survive, these being Mesdames M. W. Parrish and A. R. Winningham, of Asheboro.

For many years the deceased has been a faithful and consistent member of the M. P. church at Charlotte near the old home where Mr. and Mrs. Crowson lived until about eight years ago when they moved to Asheboro.
