Freight on the many cars of water that had to be hauled into Asheboro from our neighboring city for many weeks has mounted up to a considerable sum. There is no way to pay this emergency expense other.

The town board in a recent meeting ed the water rate for next meter pays a flat rate of \$3 per month fless of the amount of water med. Others pay according to

the amount used.

These water bills as well as those in the months to come must be paid by the I5th of the month, according to a ruling of the town board, else the water supply to the person who is in arrears will be cut off and a charge made for reinstating.

The authorities are hopeful that the increased water rate will not last more than three months at the most. They assure the people of the town that the rate will be reduced just as soon as the bills are paid for the water that has had to be hauled into Asheboro from High Point and the other necessary expenses occasioned as the second second
