The county board of education met in regular monthly session Monday in the office of the county superintendent with L. F. Ross, chairman, and J. F. Hughes present. A number of patrons from Bell's Grove and Gravel Hill districts in New Hope township presented a petition to the board asking that their district boundaries remain as now constituted for the reason that they were opposed to consoli-dation of school districts in any form. These patrons were assured by the board that when the matter of school district consolidation in New Hope comes up again for consideration an opportunity would be given each side to discuss the proposition.

The school committee of Marlboro and Sophia districts came before the board and requested that the local tax levy made several years ago in their districts be reinstated. Request was granted by the board and a levy of 25 cents on the \$100 valuation will be made, the proceeds derived from the tax to be used to pay tuition of students from these districts in any high school in the county they may desire to attend and the remainder to be used to increase the length of the school terms in the two districts.

It was the decision of the board that if the local tax election to be held in Back Creek and Tabernacle township carries that the consolidated school building will be built at the center of the territory running from east to west on Highway 75, or within one-half mile from the center on


