New Chairman Says People Have a Right To Know How Their Money Is Spent.

The Militant Democracy of Randolph county met in the court house in Asheboro last Saturday afternoon, elected I. C. Moser for county chairman upon motion of the retiring chairman, C. C. Cranford, named delegates to the State convention being held in Raleigh today and heard a speech by the new chairman. There was no business to transact other than the election of a chairman and delegates to the State convention and this was dispensed with in short order. Harmony prevailed throughout the meeting. Moser was named chairman by acclamation and there was no contest over the names of the delegates selected.
