House numbers and mail boxes should be in place by June 15th if Asheboro is to obtain this city deliva ery. The local postoffice authorities are required by the Postoffice Department at Washington to make a report on the 15th of this month, fifteen days before the city delivery is inaugurated. At that time 85 per cent of the homes in town must be numbered and have mail boxes in place, else city delivery will be de-layed and may be lost altogether.
