Contracts were let Monday from the office of the county superintendent of school for the building of Balfour and Providence consolidated school buildings. Mr. W. A. Underwood was the successful bidder for the Balfour school building to be located about two miles north of Asheboro, near King Tut. His bid for the job was \$17,851.54 and was the lowest out of 14, the highest being \$24,195.69.

### Board Passes On **Important Matter**

Accepts Proposal Town Board To Let 100 Outside Students Attend Local School.

The county board of education in session Monday in the office of County Superintendent T. Fletcher Bulla, with L. F. Ross, J. A. Martin and J. F. Hughes, members of the board, present, accepted the proposition made by the Asheboro city school board allowing one hundred pupils living in the community adjacent to the Asheboro district to enter the school at Asheboro. The city school board proposes that each pupil be charged \$3 per month for three months and that the county pay the tuition for the other six months. The patrons who live outside of the district and who send their children to the town school will, therefore, have to pay in advance \$9 tuition fee for each pupil. This entitles the pupil to every advantage of the regular nine months term of the Asheboro school. This arrangement holds good for the school year 1926-27.

It was ordered by the school board that the pupils in the Red Cross district, Providence township, go to Liberty school for one month beginning with the September term, the same transportation to be furnished as last year.

Parks Cross Roads school was granted another teacher provided that an average attendance is maintained to justify the employment of an additional teacher. The teacher shall be withdrawn at Christmas if the attendance is not kept up.

It was recommended by the board that all the schools in the county having a six months term begin Oct. 11, which is the second Monday in the month.
