Mr. Andrews was twice wounded while serving in the Confederate Army and was taken prisoner. He was taken to Fort Delaware where he was kept for nine months, after which he was sent home to begin life anew in a devastated, desolate section. Soon after his return he married Miss Elizabeth Spencer Hicks and to this union were the following surviving sons and daughters: H. L. and N. S. Andrews, Asheboro; Mrs. Henry Poole and Miss Lula Andrews, Back Creek township; and J. M. Andrews, Lake Steams, Fla. Mr. T. C. Hicks, a step son, was reared in the

fortunate in having been associated with a man whose influence and whose example have been so splendid. In every walk of life, church, civic, social and military, he measured up and it might well be said of him that he was weighed in the balance and not found wanting. Probably next to his home and church allegiance came his military career in which he had much pride.
