

Snow Of Last Week Was Infant After All

The "old timers" have no inten-The "old timers" have no inten-tion of letting the snow of last week go down in history as the biggest snow that has fallen in North Carolina in a hundred years. W. T. Whitsett, writing from Whit-sett Institute, has it that there are sett Institute, has it that there are two old persons in his community who well remember the snow that fell in the month of January, 1857. Their recollection is that the snow was from four to six feet deep on the level and from 8 to 10 feet deep in drifts. Split rail fences were entirely covered. The snow lay on the ground for a month, and during that time a heavy crust froze over it so hard that sleighs could be driven over it. It is re-lated by one of the old persons Mr. Whitsett quotes that in one instance a man on horseback was overcome in his struggles in a snow drift near Gibsonville and man and horse were rescued with man and horse were rescued with difficulty.
