# An Equitable Basis

List Takers Are Trying To Get All Property On Books At Fair Value.

## No Favors Are Given

Appears All Classes Are Being Treated Alike.

In view of the fact that various and sundry statements have been made with reference to the tax listing and reassessment of real estate in progress in every township in the cou this newspaper has taken it upon itself to look into the matter in an effort to arrive at the facts. As far as can be ascertained, the tax asses ment in Randolph is proceeding on a fair basis with reference to all classes of property. No favors should be given any one class over another in the valuing of personal property and real estate, and investigation disc that this is not being done anywhere in the county.

It is the expressed purpose of those in charge of the reass of property in the county to get all real estate on the books on an equitable basis. It has been eight years since real estate was assessed Randolph. Four years ago the sessment put on four years prior that time was retained. It will be recalled that after the reasses eight years ago a flat cut of 30 per cent was made on real estate value Maddox Killed In Wreck as shown by the tax abstracts. This cut was not made by several counties in the State with the result that Randolph found her values low-er than several counties which she had previously led in value of real estate.
