County Assumes Indebtedness Of Special School Tax Districts

An action of the utmost importance was taken Monday at the meetings of the board of education and board of commissioners for the county in the taking over by the county of the indebtedness of all special school districts, lawfully incurred in erecting and equipping school buildings. This apples to all special districts in the county with the exception of Asheboro. Special school districts affected are Liberty, Gray's Chapel, Trinity, Randleman, Balfour, Staley, Seagrove, Worthville, Central Falls, Farmer, Ramseur and Providence.

It means that the special school create an indebtedness for the erection of the county of the indebtedness amounts to \$27, 723.50.

The resolution embodying this change was drawn by the board of education and presented to the county commissioners, who, in turn, drew up a set of resolutions setting forth the acceptance of the resolution that no district should have to bond itself or create an indebtedness for the erections.
