EXPOSING OFFICIAL CORRUPTION

Golden Text: "Be sure your sin will find you out." (Num. 32: 23b.)

(1 Kings 21: 5-10, 16-20.)

5 But Jezebel his wife came to him, and said unto him, Why is thy spirit so sad, that thou eatest no bread?

6 And he said unto her, Because I spake unto Naboth the Jezreelite, and said unto him, Give me thy vineyard for money; or else, if it please thee, I will give thee another vineyard for it; and he answered, I will not give thee my vineyard.

7 And Jezebel his wife said unto him, Dost thou now govern the kingdom of Israel? Arise, and eat bread, and let thine heart be merry: I will give thee the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite.

8 So she wrote letters in Ahab's name, and sealed them with his seal, and sent the letters unto the elders and to the nobles that were in his city, dwelling with Naboth.

9 And she wrote in the letters, saying, Proclaim a fast, and set Naboth on high among the people;

10 And set two men, sons of Belial, before him, to bear witness against him, saying, Thou didst blaspheme God and the king; and then carry him out, and stone him, that he may die.

16 And it came to pass, when Ahab heard that Naboth was dead, that Ahab rose up to go down to the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite, to take possession of it.

17 And the word of the Lord came to Elijah, the Tishbite, saying,

18 Arise, go down to meet Ahab king of Israel, which is in Samaria; behold, he is in the vineyard of Naboth, whither he is gone down to possess it.

19 And thou shalt speak unto him, saying, Thus saith the Lord, Hast thou killed, and also taken possession? And thou shalt speak unto him, saying, Thus saith the Lord, In the place where dogs licked the blood of Naboth shall dogs lick thy blood, even thine.

20 And Ahab said to Elijah, Hast thou found me, O mine enemy? And he answered, I have found thee; because thou hast sold thyself to work evil in the sight of the Lord.

Ahab was anxious for the vineyard of Naboth that he may have this addition to his summer palace. He offered to buy it with money or give him another. This did not suit Naboth as he wanted to keep the one he had, first it was an inheritance, second it was illegal under the Jewish statutes. If this were the end of the matter, well it would have been, but he was hurt to think that any would refuse him anything, so he was sad and would not eat. Jezebel which carried out the wishes of Ahab when she promised she would give him the vineyard. He allowed her to use his name and seal in her corruption. She was able to work a perfect plan and it meant the execution of Naboth. But we must remember that it is impossible to commit sin without suffering for it. It is very easy today to get false witnesses but they will pay heavily for their falsehoods.

They had the fast, Naboth was accused and stoned so that he died. Things began to look good to Ahab, so he goes down to take possession of Naboth's vineyard. Sooner than he expected was he called to give an

account for the deed he had approved of. There are a great number of people left that the Lord can depend upon to do his work. Elijah goes down with a message from God. Oh today how we need brave men to take God's message at any cost to the high as well as the low. It is easy for us to jump on the ones that are already down, but how slow are we to expose those who are higher up but corrupt. If Ahab had known that in the very vineyard he would have been found and reproved would he have done as he did? Yes. We know our sins will give us out and in this knowledge we go and commit sin.

Those who, in our present industrial and commercial system of life, are guilty of crimes against their employees for the sake of profits would do well to remember that a curse rests upon gains gotten through injustice. The obligation to speak out against evil, whether in high places or in low, finds emphasis in this lesson. Ahab's dissatisfaction proved very costly to him. If we could learn that it is better to lay up treasures in heaven than on earth we would have learned a great lesson. I think we are under moral obligation to expose any corruption that we know is being practiced.
