Prospects Good For Obtaining Another Silk Hosiery Mill

Asheboro finds itself with the very pleasant prospect of obtaining another mill for the manufacture of full-fashioned silk hosiery of a very superior quality. And the town is more or less elated over indications which point to the consummation of the project at a very early date. J. C. Bossong, of New York, and some of his associates, some of them local, have been looking over the situation in Asheboro for the past several days with view to locating a mill of this nature here. It is understood that several sites have been looked over and that options have been obtained on some of these with view to location of the mill. Definite arrangements on the location of the mill probably will be made the latmill probably will be made the lat-ter part of the week. Asheboro al-ready consumes more silk yarn in the manufacture of silk and semisilk hosiery than any other town or city in the State, and has four large hosiery mills, namely Acme, Parks, Cranford and Asheboro: The addition of another mill would place the town still farther in the lead.
