Hull Forces Win Signal Victory In Convention

At Raleigh Tuesday—Majority Of State's Delegation To Houston For Hull. Smith Gets A Few Estimate Of Smith Strength Is From Four and One-Half Votes to 9 Or 10.

In the most turbulent and the most largely attended State Democratic convention in twenty years, North Carolina Democrats in the municipal auditorium in Raleigh Tuesday named their delegates to the National convention at Houston on June 26th.

The Delegates Delegates-at-large selected by the test vote were: Senator F. M. Simmons, Craven county; Josephus Daniels, Wake; Word H. Wood, Mecklenburg; W. C. Newland, Caldwell; Mrs. T. P. Jerman, Wake; Mrs. W. H. Belk, Mecklenburg; Miss May F. Jones, Buncombe; and Mrs. J. G. Fearing, of Pasquotank. All are pledged to vote for Cordell Hull for President.

Prior to the convening of the State convention, delegates from the ten Congressional districts held their meetings and selected delegates. Each district is entitled to two votes in the national Democratic convention. Some of the districts named two delegates and two alternates, while others named four delegates with a half vote.

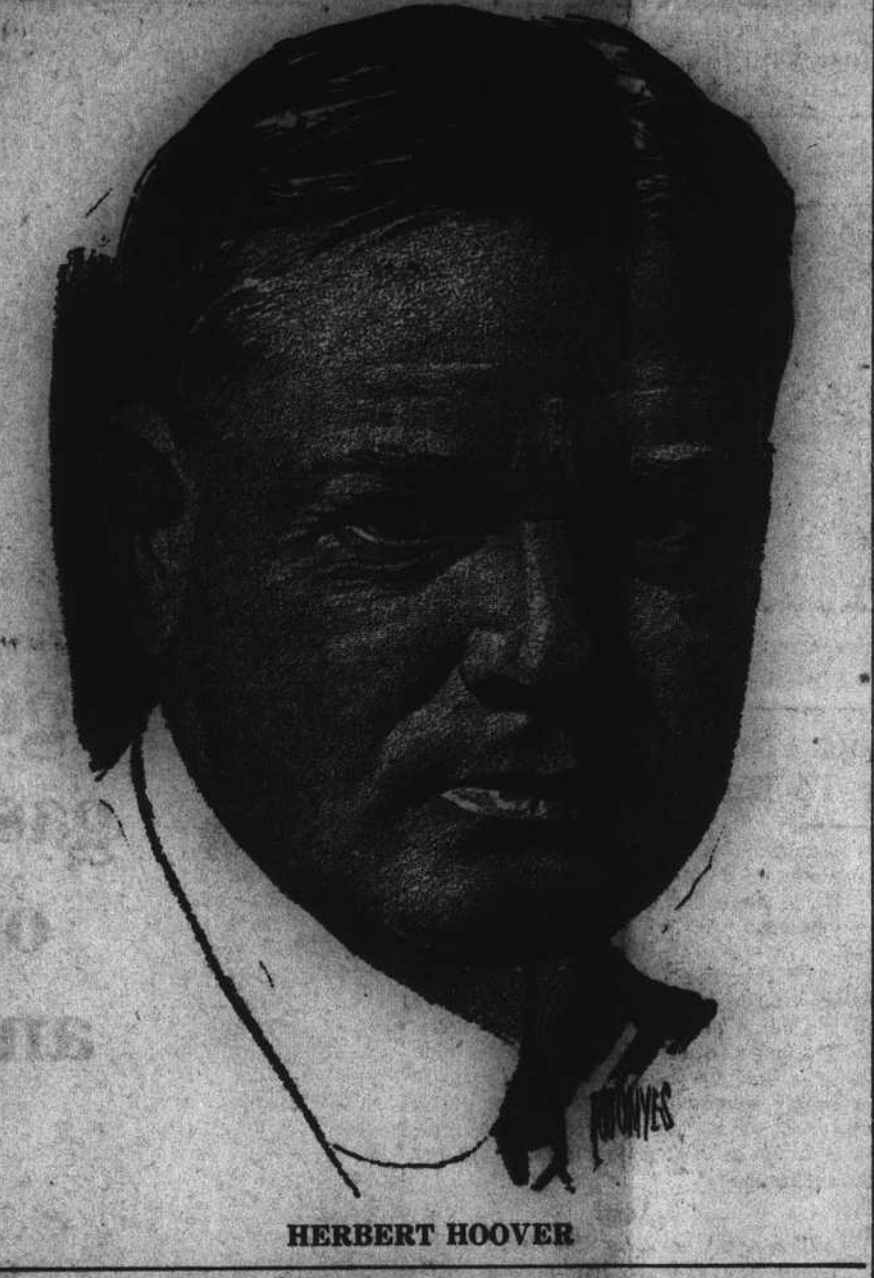

Langston Has Privilege Asking For Second Primary

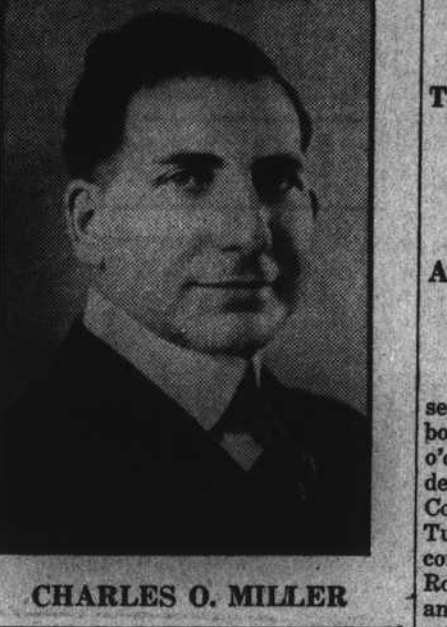

Hull Winner In Democratic Meet On Last Saturday

Test Vote Taken In Accordance With The Plan Of Organization And Hull Wins. Almost Two To One

And County Delegation To Raleigh Is Two-Thirds For Hull, Third For Smith

Democrats of Randolph county assembled in the court house in Asheboro Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock for the purpose of electing delegates to the State Democratic Convention which met in Raleigh Tuesday. L. C. Moser brought the convention to order and called H. M. Robins to the chair. E. D. Cranford and Talmadge Bulla were made secretaries. A roll call disclosed that every precinct in the county except three was represented with large delegations.

At the very outset of the convention, Arthur Ross made a motion that all Democrats in the county be made delegates to the State convention Tuesday and that they be instructed to cast the 96 votes of the county half for Cordell Hull for President and the other half for Alfred E. Smith. This brought John W. Clark, of Franklinsville, to his feet with the request that a vote be taken and the delegation instructed against Smith and for Hull. It was finally decided that a vote should be taken and that the delegation to Raleigh be instructed according to the results of such vote and that each candidate voted on for President should have his proportionate part of the vote of the county delegation at Raleigh on Tuesday.
