In the most turbulent and the most largely attended State Democratic convention in twenty years, North Carolina Democrats in the municipal anditorium in Raleigh Tuesday named their delegates to the National convention at Houston on June 26th. From the hour at which the convention was called to order by Thomas D. Warren, who had been selected chairman, until 8:30 Tuesday night, the fight raged on the convention floor between the supporters of Cordell Hull, of Tennessee, and Alfred E. Smith, of New York. And yet, during the long hours from 12:25 p. m to 8:30 p. m., only one test of strength was actually made. This was a roll call to name delegates at large to the Houston meeting, with the average vote 1,073 to 880 in favor of the Hull slate. Senstor F. M. Simmons and Josephus Daniels led the Hull slate with 1,179 and 1,159 votes respectively, while Cameron Morrison, of Charlotte, former Governor of North Carolina, led the Smith slate with 906.85 votes.


