E. A. Routh Resigns As Register Of Deeds Effective 31st Day December

Resignation Tendered To Board Of Commissioners Monday And Same Was Accepted.

John Bulla Chosen For Rest Of Term

Randleman Young Man Will Take Over Office January 1—Resignation A Surprise

E. A. Routh, Register of Deeds for Randolph county, at the meeting of the board of county commissioners Monday, tendered his resignation effective December 31, which was accepted by the board.

The resignation was accepted by the commissioners, who immediately, by unanimous vote, elected John Bulla of Randleman, to fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Routh.

Mr. Bulla is a son of Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Bulla, of Randleman, and is one of the popular young Democrats of the county.

Mr. Routh, who lives at Rameur, but who will move his family to Asheboro about the first of the new year, was elected to the office of Register of Deeds in November, 1930.

From 1926 to 1928 he served the county in the same capacity, and was a candidate to succeed himself in 1928, only to lose out in the Republican landslide of that year.

Text of Mr. Routh's resignation, submitted to the board Monday and accepted, follows: "I herewith tender my resignation as Register of Deeds for Randolph county, North Carolina, and also as clerk to your board."

Large Number Of Pupils Examined At Tubercular Clinics
