# Randolph Farmers **Favor Retention** Present Loan Act

They Feel That New Distric Lean Committee Plan Would React Unfavorably.

## Loans Being Paid

Prompt Payment Loans Noted In Randolph; New Plan Cut\* Out Small Farmer,

There is strong sentiment among darm workers locally for Senator Smith's bill, now in the Congressional hopper, appropriating 100 million dollars to continue direct crop production loans to farmers. The senate has reported the bill favorably, but there is doubt it will find favor with the administration.

Several weeks ago officials of the administration expressed dissatisfaction with the present crop production loan system, which was inaugurated five years ago.

A check up on the local situation shows that 862 crop production loans were made by the federal government to as many Randolph farmers last year, approximating \$20,000 Ninety per cent of these toans have been repaid, and had the tobacco markets not been closed, the entire amount would probably have been repaid by this time. Collections on crop production loans in Randolph are said to be exceptionally good. These loans were made largely in small amounts at 5½ per cent interest, with growing crops or pros-

It requires no loans under \$50 and calls for 10% of all loans, whatever the amount may be, shall be taken in stock certificates. Requirement is made also that sufficient collateral shall back the loans on which 6 per cent interest will be charged. The large number of Randolph farmers do not need loans under crop production or any other plan. But hundreds of farmers can use a small loan to enable them to make a crop, provided they can get the money with their prospective crops as collateral.

# Cranford Lot Selected As Site For Proposed New Postoffice Building

Information in the form of a telegram from Edw. W. Pou, fourth district Congressman, to Arthur Ross, received Tuesday afternoon, is to the effect that the Cranford lot on the corner of Church street and Sumset avenue has been approved by the Treasury committee as site for Asheboro's new postoffice building.

The lot selected is one belonging to G. C. Cranford, and long occupied by himself and family as a home; but after construction of his more modern stone dwelling on South Fayetteville, rented, and still later and at present occupied by the Pugh Funeral Home. It was one of several offered the government for the new postoffice site several months ago.

The telegram did not state the size of the lot approved by the committee. Offers were made of lots from the Cranford property 100, 120 and 155 feet. Minimum
