The petition as presented to Dr. Stallings follows:

Having observed the fine work being done by your organization in the control of soil erosion in the upper part of Deep River basin, we earnestly request that the area be enlarged and extended down the river to Ramseur. Such extension, we feel, will not only prove of great benefit to the farmers included in this drainage area, but also to the various water power sites located along the river. This stream as you doubtless know, has a fall of 550 feet from Randleman to Haywood, a distance of 40 miles, and in this space there are located a number of mill ponds which are now furnishing power. This territory was included in the original area recommended by the Governor, Dr. Holmes, Dr. Winters and the State Department of Con-

In making this request we are expressing the sentiment of our entire community and we hope that you may see your way clear to extend the soil erosion control over this area before moving elsewhere.


