Any property owner is eligible for a modernization credit loan, provided he owns his property (even with incumbrances), his income is five times the amount of his annual payment of notes and his credit is in good standing. In the case of farmers, payments are made annually or semi-annually. Under the Modernization credit loan one may borrow from \$100.00 to \$2,-000.00 for a period of one to five years at the rate of \$5.00 per \$100.00 per year.

Such loans are called government insured loans because the United States Government insures financial institutions or any approved lending agency 20 per cent against loss of the aggre-

gate amount of loans made during the five year period. The highest loss ever sustained by financial institutions making similar loans has been 3 per cent. The margain of guarantee made by the United States Government, therefore, makes this a 100 per cent guarantee against
