Answer: This depends upon how long your animals are to be fed. The average cow will consume about one cubic foot of silage each day. A slice of silage from three to five inches thick beginning at the top and going to the bottom should be fed daily to prevent spoilage. The suggested dimensions for a silo to take care of 12 cows is 7 feet wide at top, 5 feet wide picked up with the scratch feed toat bottom, and 6 feet deep. For a 180 day feeding period the silo should be 60 feet long. For a longer feeding
