RUTHLESS DESTRUCTION

Already cars are speeding through Asheboro laden with evergreens from our beautiful woods. Our forests are too lovely to destroy with ruthless and vandal hands. There are times when we need evergreens, but many people who go into the woods for such work have and get more than they actually need or want without thought to the future.

There are many evergreen shrubs and plants that we could plant in our own yards and have for our own use who have plenty of yard space. The time will soon come that we will really have to "take steps" about this destruction of our forests. Before that time, let's think before we break.

HERE ARE THE FIGURES

Some people are praising the state highway patrol to the skies while others are equally as derogatory of the group. Perhaps both opinions are from personal prejudice, which is hardly fair either way. Either the patrol is worth its keep or it is not. Records are better proof than any one's personal opinion.

Reports are available at the central office in Raleigh and the following facts are given out as authentic.

Drunken drivers arrested in October by State Highway Patrol increased to 217 from 360 the month before, Captain Charles A. Farmer

reports. The patrolmen made 2,898 arrests during the month for traffic and highway law violations. Those convicted were sentenced to an aggregate of 60 years and 10 months, and fined \$25,145, with court costs of \$16,625. The 121 patrolmen investigated 388 highway accidents in which 44 persons were killed and 260 injured. They recovered property valued at \$11,050.

From these facts we can better decide what we think. These men are taught to be courteous with their enforcement of the laws of the state, and with few exceptions, this conceded to be true. They are also told, especially since the increase in the patrol, that they must play favorites. The fact that men are sent to new territory is a help in this line. Their figures are always available for publication and time will tell how things go.

HICKORY—STYLE

The town of Hickory has hit upon a clever plan. Chief of Police T. W. Lantz has become tired of warning people who make a practice of needless hickory blowing. He looked up two men who were on the thirteenth of November and promised more arrests. The chief remarked that he believed people should pay for their fun.

People do pay for their fun—often the other people. Certainly this is the case of those who must listen to horn-blowers. Many innocent people pay. The Chief's idea coincides with ours—let the horn-blower pay, and pay well. It is pretty bad to just drop into a sleep to be aroused with the sudden, shrill horn of a car outside your—or your neighbor's—door.
