UNOFFICIAL REPORT COUP DETAT IN JAPAN

Unoficial reports from China said that martial law was prochimed in Tokyo Tuesday after the assassination of several Japanese political leaders. The Reuters (British) news agency reported from Shanghai that a coup d'etat had placed the powerful militarist in control of the government. No direct word was received from Tokyo however, because of a strict censorship.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE VETOES \$50,000,000 SEED LOAN BILL

President Roosevelt vetoed the seed loan bill Wednesday saying that the amount sought was too large. In returning the bill to the senate the president reminded it that in approving the 1934 540,000,000 seed loan bill he did so on the theory that it was proper to taper off the crop loan system which was initiated on large scale in 1931. He added that he would issue an executive order in the next few days to meet any needs for loans to produce new crops.

Except for the right to vote, the liberty and privileges accorded women under the constitution, Mrs. Greathouse declares, are substantially those of the women of England in 1789, since its provisions are formed in the language of the English law and interpreted by the Supreme Court on that basis. According to T. F. Bulla, superintendent of education in the county,

work clearing the ground will com-mence early next week. The location of the new building will not be on the Lewis field, as was previously stated, but on a lot on Park street across from Frazier park.

The reason for this change of location is chiefly because of the widrawal of certain funds promised the larger lot on Sunset avenue. At this matter came to the attention the county commissioners, the county school board, it was necessary to look about for another lot with an east and west exposure since the plans of the building called for this light exposure. The contract for the erection of the building was given on December 19, 1935.

The building will be of brick, ten rooms and auditorium, music rooms, offices and rest rooms. The total cost is estimated at something over \$40,000, including equipment, heat, etc.
