## Morale Improved By Prison Shops

Richmond, Va .-- Virginia's prison industries are far more valuable as morale-building agencies than as places for the manufacture of products for state use, according to H. E. Fitzgerald, former industrial director at the state penitentiary. "It is true," he said, "that spiritual guidance in the way of religious services, properly directed reading, discipline, and many other adjuncts of prison life must play roles in a system where rehabilitation is the objective; yet there is no element in a system that offers the opportunity to reclaim inmates of a correctional institution comparable to work with its kindred relationships. In the shops men learn to approach a problem from the proper angle; learn the value of system and collaboration and many other essentials to any project de-pendent upon joint effort."

pontiff had sat for two hours in his glass enclosed sun porch, when he suddenly announced that he would walk-with fair results.




