Re-Appointment Appeared Certain From Beginning

Named As Head

Appointment Pleases Widely Popular Man's Ability Proves Record For His

Reappointment Allen J. Maxwell, state revenue ommissioner since 1929, was reappointed Friday by Governor Clyde Hoey to succeed himself for term of four years ending

January 1, 1941. Barring the commission to Judge A. Hall Johnston a week ago this was the first big appointment that his excellency has made. Judge Johnston's was an extra as it came through resignation of Judge P.

A. McElroy of the 19th district.

There never had been any doubt that Commissioner Maxwell would succeed himself. He was first named in 1929 by Governor Max Gardner who made the appointment after the law was changed taking the revenue commissionership from an elective status. Originally A. D. Watts was made revenue commis sioner by appointment to an office which universally had been understood to have been created for Maxwell.
