ity On Textiles Speaks Iill Owners At World Conference

Cites Achievements

Refers To Proposed Third Shift As A Menace To The **Textile Industry**

Addressing the World Textile Conference in Washington as the official spokesman of all employers in the industry and as one of the three delegates representing this country appointed by the President, former Governor O. Max Gardner highly praised the industry for voluntary adherence to NRA standards since the invalidation of the NRA; and predicted that such adherence will continue.

Mr. Gardner listed the "principle of collective bargaining" as one of the four practices to which the industry is committed. rides unafraid. She lives in Lima, Peru, there appearing in contests against bulls, but also has been often

"In this country there was difference of opinion about the value and helpfulness of the National Industrial Recovery Act," Governor Gardner told the conference.

"In the long run, in 1935, the act was invalidated by the Supreme Court, but in a case in which the labor provisions were not directly involved. 
