JEFFERSON DAVIS IN HISTORY.

The death of Jefferson Davis suggests in thoughtful minds many lessons in history as well as social ethics and national development. In history his name is linked with Jefferson's and Calhoun's. This is the succession of great democrats who have given to the South its distinctive features, and which points out the landmarks of democracy in our republic. Calhoun spent his early manhood as a student and contemporary statesman with Jefferson. He thus obtained his lessons in the nature of the constitution and the genius of our republican form of government, which his great mind and eloquence enabled him to explain as no other man has been able to do except Jefferson Davis.

Mr. Davis was a disciple, so to speak, of Calhoun. When Calhoun was at the zenith of his usefulness and fame, Davis entered public life and became a co-worker in national politics with Calhoun as the leader. When Calhoun died, we believe in 1850, Jefferson Davis was the only living man who embodied in its entirety all the principles which Jefferson framed together and which Calhoun comprehended and taught with so much clearness and power. It is perfectly natural, then, that he should have been chosen as President of the Confederacy. The great Mr. Davis shows himself in his marvelous comprehension of the Jefferson and Calhoun democracy which was the political creed of the entire South. The unswerving stability which he exhibited while President of the Confederacy was simply wonderful. Had he adopted any of the policies, measures and subtleties, which were urged on him from many sources during the war, he would have sacrificed his own consistency and that of his party; while all see now that none of the proposed remedies would have succeeded in stopping the war or bettering the condition of the South. The Southern mind and cause were embodied in the President of the Confederacy. The only logical course was the one Mr. Davis took—fight it out to the end.

Since the war closed Mr. Davis still embodied and taught the doctrine he tried so hard to establish in the Confederacy. The whole South was in mind and heart remained true to him whom they chose as their exponent and leader.

As a representative of the Old South, Mr. Davis was a fit successor of Jefferson and Calhoun. They were alike elegant specimens of physical manhood; so was Jefferson Davis. Jefferson and Calhoun had masterly minds thoroughly trained and stored with great learning; so had Davis. Jefferson and Calhoun were men of integrity, faithful to their principles and to their constituents; so was Jefferson Davis.

The Anglo Saxon liberty and democracy survived the deaths of Jefferson and Calhoun, so they will the death of Jefferson Davis. The great events of Mr. Davis' long career during and since the war, have written his name on pages in his history where it will ever stand even more conspicuous than that of Jefferson; for in Davis the power of Jeffersonian principles met their greatest shock and are winning their greatest triumph.
