

GEN. GORDEN CAPTURES BERBER.

CAIRO, July 30.—The Mudir of Douglas telegraphs that reports have reached that city to the effect that Gen. Gordon has captured Berber. The Mudir says he has sent an official telegram to Delbah to ascertain the truth of the reports.

A SPEC OF WAR IN CHINA.

LONDON, July 30.—A dispatch from Foo Chow to the Times states that great tension and excitement prevails in that city among both foreigners and Chinese. The French men-of-war lying off that port are under steam and cleared for action. High authority in Foo Chow, however, declares peace will certainly be maintained.

DEMPEY WINS THE FIGHT IN TWENTY-ONE ROUNDS.

NEW YORK, July 30.—The Dempsey and Fulljames fight for \$2,000, was decided this morning. Ned Mellolan was referee. Dempsey was seconded by Arthur Chambers and Prof. Watson Fulljames, and was seconded by John Flood and Barney Aron; umpire was Jim Shanau, a well-known sporting man. The fight was a desperate one. Dempsey gained the first blood and the first knock-down, and won in 21 rounds, lasting 35 minutes.

COSTLY FUN.

CINCINNATI, July 31.—A terrible explosion occurred in the house of Henry Upmeyer, 21 Orenoa street, this morning. A young son of Upmeyer brought home an unexploded rocket that had fallen from the Highland House, where there had been an exhibition of fireworks last night. The lad tried to open it, but failing to do so his mother seized a hatchet and dealt it a severe blow. A terrific explosion followed. Mrs. Upmeyer was fatally injured, Ida Upmeyer, aged twelve, fatally injured, Charles Upmeyer, aged six, severely hurt, and Phillip Hill, aged ten, slightly injured. It was a six-pound rocket. The vicinity of the explosion was fearfully wrecked.

THE SUSPENSION OF DE WOLF & SWAN

NEW YORK, July 30.—In relation to the suspension of De Wolf & Swan, a member of the law firm of Lord, Day & Lord says that the irregularities of their employer, W. E. Scoville do not effect the firm to the extent of \$1, and that these securities offered for hypothecation and retransfer which were the individual property of Mr. Day will all probably be discovered. W. H. Brown & Co., warn all parties against negotiation any certificates of stock standing in the name of Henry Day in the following companies as the same have been stolen: Rochester & Pittsburg railroad company, Iron Silver company, Horn silver United States Trust company and American Cable company.

WHAT NEXT?

A MEMBER OF CONGRESS TRIES TO COMMIT SUICIDE.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Wm. W. Culbertson, republican representative in Congress from the North Kentucky district, attempted suicide today by shooting himself five times, in his room at the National Hotel. Two of the shots were in the back of the head, and depressed the skull, but did not penetrate the brain. His chances for recovery are slight. He had been drinking hard recently, and to that circumstance is due his present condition. He went about the deed with great determination and deliberation. He shipped his trunks home to Kentucky, then entered another room some distance from the one he had been occupying, fired five shots, and when he heard search was being made for the locality of the shooting he unlocked the door, and streaming with blood, admitted to the officer, saying that he was afraid that he had not been successful, but he would be another time. He then collapsed, and is now at the Providence Hospital, his life hanging by a slender thread.

George D. Wise Renominated.

RICHMOND, VA., July 30.—The Democratic convention of the third Congressional district met here at noon and unanimously re-nominated Hon. Geo. D. Wise for Congress.

THE CHOLERA CONTINUES TO SPREAD—DOCTORS ASSAULTED.

MARSEILLES, July 30.—The scales of melons have been prohibited within the city. The cholera is gaining in area what it is losing in intensity. The disease has made its appearance in several villages which had previously been exempt. Owing to proper prejudice it is positively dangerous for doctors to walk alone in the suburbs at night. One instance is reported of a doctor, who while visiting a woman who had been seized with cholera, was assaulted by her son who drew a revolver and compelled him to leave the house. Several other doctors have also been assaulted.

PARIS, July 30.—There were 12 deaths from cholera at Marseilles last night and 10 at Toulon. The force of the epidemic in these two cities continues to decline. About three hundred fugitives have returned to their homes in the last two days.

ROME, July 30.—A case of cholera has occurred near Lacca.

SICK CATTLE AT CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, July 30.—The arrival of a number of sick cattle having been reported at the Union stock yards in this city, an examination was made by a number of veterinarians this morning, who are not yet ready to submit their official report. The fact is known, however, that they agreed that the disorder is Texas fever, superinduced by drinking water strongly impregnated with alkali. The cattle have been securely quarantined and isolated. Those in the lot that are unaffected are to be slaughtered, subject to the inspection of the health department. Those that are unable to recover are being shot, and those that are droopy will be held in quarantine for further developments.
