**ZEB VANCE FOR THE SENATE.**

The next General Assembly will have several important duties to discharge. Among these will be the selection of a successor to Senator Z. B. Vance. We believe we voice the sentiment of the Democracy of the entire State, when we say that Senator Vance should be his own successor. Not only this, but he merits a nomination by acclamation. We wish to see this great compliment bestowed upon him. He deserves it, and it should be given him. Senator Vance's term in the Senate has added to his already brilliant reputation, as patriot, statesman and orator. He has acquired a national fame. He has won the esteem, gratitude and love of our great sister commonwealth for his valuable services in the Danville investigation. He stands to-day among the leading Senators, and wields a large influence in national affairs. His course in the Senate has reflected credit upon himself and upon the State he represents. Let the next Legislature fairly express the sentiments and wishes of the people, and Vance will be re-elected without opposition. Mott, Johnston and others of the coalition, will stand no more chance for election than they did two years ago.
