LARGE TRANSFERS.

The Asheville and Craggy Mountain Dummy Road.

For the past few months Messrs. Gwyn & West have been negotiating some big trades in lands lying to the northeast of the city. Among other sales made by this firm they have sold to Cincinnati parties for Hon. Thos. D. Johnston, 170 acres at \$51,000, for D. D. Suttle, 133 acres at \$15,000; and for Capt. T. W. Patton, 108 acres at \$21,500. The Patton land all lies above Sunset Drive and its extreme limit is two and a half miles from the Court House on an air line, and 900 feet higher than the city.

Mr. W. B. Gwyn, of the firm, has bought out his co-owner, Mr. G. W Swain, of Danville, Va., in 96 acres, at \$25,000.
