### A N ORDINANCE,

To provide that the Aldermen of the City of Asheville may negotiate a loan of One Hun-dred Thousand Dollars, for the use and benefit of said city, as set forth in said ordinance: Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Asheville, That for the purpose of obtaining the consent of a majority of the qualified and registered voters of the city that the Board of Alderman of the said city may borrow the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars, to be applied to the construction of a system of Sewerage, and other necessary and permanent improvements, an election shall be held on Tuesday, July the 10th A. D. 1888 at the usual voting place, and under the rules and regulations governing such elections in said city; and if the consent of the required majority shall be obtained at such election, then the Board of Aldermen may borrow said sum of money upon the bonds of the said city to be made and issued, in their discretion, in the denomination of Fifty, One Hundred and Five Hundred Dollars, with interest coupons attached,

The said bonds shall become due and payable thirty years from their date and for interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, according to the coupons attached, on the first days of January and July in each andevery year. And they shall be signed by the Mayor and counter signed by the Treasurer, and be under the

seal of said city. The said bonds shall in no case be disposed of, sold, assigned, or transferred for a less The coupons of said bonds shall be at all times when due, receivable in payment of
