Gossip is one of the prominent evils of most all communities. In some places it is worse than others. Asheville is not free from it. We have so many public places where large numbers of people gather from all sections of the country, that it would be a miracle if the gossips did not get in their work. And it is not confined to the female portion of society by any means, but men, young and old, sometimes try their hand at the business. It is very common to hear indiscreet remarks made about people and these remarks are taken up and repeated until they appear to be the truth, whereas there is no truth in half the complimentary things you hear people say about one another. It is frequently the case that at boarding houses and hotels this thing is indulged in to a considerable extent. It is all wrong. The gossips are the vultures of society, and it is their business to find bad odors, and they are always on the hunt of tainted atmosphere. They are ill at ease until they find it, and if the real article is not forthcoming it is manufactured. To the unclean all things are unclean. Better talk about the good that is in people and let the bad alone. The bad is on the surface, but the good is underneath. Look for the latter and eschew the former.

Hon. T. D. Johnston, the inveterate enemy of the internal revenue system has succeeded in giving the execution of the law a black eye. He, representatives Cowles and Henderson have worked zealously for the repeal or modification of the law both in caucus and House. When the Sundry civil appropriation bill was under consideration last week, Capt. Johnston offered and secured the passage of an amendment that U. S. Commissioners and deputy marshal be allowed no fees unless the prosecutions are endorsed by the district attorney, and the complaint is made

by a party personally cognizant of the facts or by a collector or deputy collector. This would undoubtedly put a stop to a large per cent of the prosecutions for violations of the internal revenue law for but few persons would volunteer as witnesses and institute prosecutions. The amendment passed by a strict party vote, the Republicans voting in the negative, which demonstrates that while they are professedly in favor of repealing the law, they are for its retention intact.—McDowell Bugle.
