## Temperance Notes.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union held its first meeting on Thursday last, under its new board of officers. It hopes to enter with new zeal and energy on its work of enlightening public sentiment in regard to the evils of the liquor traffic. of so educating the young that they shall not become the victims of evil habits, and rescuing, if possible, ple. those already enslaved from the destruction that awaits them. In the war of the saloon against the home they hope to awaken the interest of conscientious voters so that no man may hope to hold office who is not for the home against the saloon, whether he be in Congress, in the Legislature, or in the city council.

The story of the Crusade is one of thrilling interest. Though few may remember its details, none who read newspaper in the winter of 1878 will forget with what anxiety they watched the progress of that movement so evidently of God. In the autumn of that year it crystalized into The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, now the largest body of organized women in the world, with a membership of over two hundred thousand.

Young Women's Christian Temperance Unions have become popular within the last few years and bid fair to eclipse in good results the mother union.

Our bright young girls with their beauty, their vivacity, their entertainments with music and flowers can excite interest where older ones have tried in vain.

The young ladies of Asheville who believe in Temperance should at once send names to the Secretary of the Y. W. C. T. U. which was organized last week, and help the success of this new factor in social life which will be a long needed bond of union among the thoughtful young people of our town.

These unions are usually called the Y's. All wise young men may become honorary members by signing the pledge and paying the membership dues.

We have no criticism to make on Mr. Walker the Prohibition candidate for Governor in this State. 




