It seems to require the larger part of Mr. Ewart's time to explain his position on the farmers' movement and the seemingly impossibility that a lawyer of his years and experience could become a member of an organization that excludes lawyers from membership.

hence I voted for the McKinley bill. Was ever so false a conclusion drawn from any premises? Does the McKinley Bill reduce taxation? We cannot impute ignorance to Mr. Ewart hence such a declaration can only result from a premeditated purpose to deceive. This measure increases taxation many millions of dollars while a reduction is made in the Revenue that goes in the Treasury. In other words it gives more money to the manufacturers, more burdens to the people and defrauds the Government. He blantly tells his readers that this bill placed sugar on the free list without telling them that it was a Southern industry and that a bounty paid out of the people's money was also provided for in the bill. This is about a fair sample of his statements on other questions of national policy, taking care to say that he stands squarely on the Alliance platform. We could believe no one capable of such barefaced frontery with the exception of Mr. Ewart. He avers that he stands upon the Alliance platform and yet his party differs from the order on every great question of national policy. He voted for the McKinley bill, which the order denounces, for a bill that practically demoralizes silver after the first of July 1891 and this is a demand of the Alliance; his party has kept up and fostered the National Banks, being so far subservient to Wall Street as to squander the surplus so that the bonds would have to be renewed instead of paid in order to preserve a basis for national banking. But we must credit Mr. Ewart for his zeal in supporting the Anti-Trust bill, but condemn his logic and honesty in making it possible for trusts to exist and when the violators are caught punish them on the criminal side of the docket. Might he not be considered a "partisan criminal"? Granting that Mr. Ewart is of wonderful ability the fact still remains that he cannot show up well to the people. To use a phrase more expressive than elegant "he's bit off more than he can chew." With his Alliance platform and directly antagonistic republican platform, together with his little independent move, he has placed himself between "the devil and the deep blue sea." He cannot be an "Allianter" in good standing without denouncing his own party and vice versa, while his independent move on the election law has made him unpopular with a certain element of his radical friends as for instance State Senator Lusk who wished "to see a man of war in every harbor and beyond at every voting precinct." In short as Mr. Ewart says he is to stand or fall on his record and as he cannot stand as has been frequently shown he must fall.

Information comes from reliable sources that the republicans of this district in their desperation, have applied at headquarters for large sums of money to purchase seats for Mr. Ewart in the next Congress. But we mistake the character of Carolina manhood in this district if this insult to the honest voters is not rebuked on the 4th of November. Shame on the man who could so eloquently plead for the manhood of his constituents in our Congress and endeavor to degrade them by purchasing a seat in the next. This insult is unpardonable Mr. Ewart and will teach you the sacredness of the ballot.

If your State legislators would impose a tax of 60 per cent on you, it unnecessary to run the Government to benefit a personal friend, how deep would their political grave be dug? Mr. Ewart voted for the McKinley bill which imposes an average tax upon all consumers of 60 per cent and you pay it just as certainly as if the Sheriff collected it out of your pockets directly. Why not submit to this robbery in the guise of law?

October 1890 will soon be numbered with the past and no school heard of yet. Have our school trustees forgotten the children of the mountain given eagerly awaiting an opportunity to acquire knowledge? It would be a sad commentary upon our manhood and progressive spirit not to have a school. Let us look to this important matter at once.

The two great political parties of the South have a maxim, which with a slight variation, is common to both. The democrats believe in "steady for revenue only" and the republicans are republicans for "revenue only." The election of Crawford is a step towards cheap hats, clothing, shoes and all the necessities of life. The election of Ewart means higher prices for all the articles the people must buy.

No man could be so indifferent to the result of the rapidly approaching election if he be true to himself and to his country. The Republican party by a series of iniquitous laws extending over a period of nearly thirty years, had forfeited all claim upon an honest man if it ever possessed the right to be trusted with power. This party has legislated for the few against the masses, has broken every promise made to an oppressed people and added insult to injury by declaring that the South was not honest enough to control her own elections. The republican party promised to revise the tariff they have done it by increasing taxation upon the necessities of life. The same party promised the Right Bill by the aid of which the poor boys of the mountains might receive a moderate, at least of education, but they were false promises made with the intent to deceive us in the former case. The same party of pledges, indirectly promised in their platform and directly by their speakers to repeal the internal revenue laws but in this as in all other promises they proved false to their constituents. With such a record how can any man who respects honor, integrity, truthfulness and his vote in perpetuating such a party in power? If fallacious is a virtue, vote the republican ticket. If robbery, though in the liver of the law, is justifiable, vote the republican ticket. If oppression is just and right, vote the republican ticket. If partisan hatred and sectional strife are commendable, vote the republican ticket. If radical, revolutionary and sectional legislation is not dangerous, vote the republican ticket. If the one man power, a Dictator compares with our Constitution and free institutions, then vote the republican ticket. But on the other hand if industry and robbery and oppression and hatred and the other long list of republican misdoings are crimes, vote the Democratic ticket and rebuke these voluntary criminals, growing rich upon your misdoings and sipping the very life blood of our nation. We believe and hope the citizens of Swain, at least, will show themselves patriots when the ties of November shall come. Bel for democracy and a glorious victory for Crawford and the entire democratic ticket.
