They are making him a special disciple sent from heaven direct to them, to give sight to the sightless, hearing to the deaf, and to relieve them of all ills, to which flesh and blood is not subject.

Today he is followed about by hundreds of Mexicans and Indians who pray to him that he touch their wounds and cure them of their ailments. Representatives of the best Mexican families are exploring him to enter their wagons, take their horses and go with them to their homes to cure the afflicted.

The man goes, he says, whither his master directs, and for the service he performs he will take nothing.

At Pera Alta, Jesus M. Velasquez, who is said to have been totally blind for three years, since he was touched this man's hands, Juliana Sedillo, who has not moved her arm for sixteen years, was working in the fields yesterday. Scores of similar stories are told.

At Sedillo, where Sedillers stayed eight days, a watch was put on him day and night, and it is asserted that he ate no food and drank but a few swallows of water.
