**The Vice Presidency.**  
It will be a matter of much importance to the nation the next Vice-President should stand for some settled policy. It is an unhealthy thing to have the Vice-President and the President represented by principals so far apart that the election means a change as radical as any possible party over turn. The straining and dislocation of our governmental institutions was very great when Tyler succeeded Harrison and Johnson succeeded Lincoln. In each case the majority of the party that had won the victory felt that it had been treated with scandalous treachery, for Tyler grew to be as repulsive to the Whigs as Polk him self, and the Republicans could scarcely have hated Johnson. The Vice-President has a three fold relation; next as presiding officer in the Senate, where he should be a man of dignity and force; and third in his social position, for socially he ranks second to the President alone. Mr. Marton was in every way an admirable Vice-President under Harrison, and had he succeeded to the presidential chair there would have been no break in the great policies which which were being pushed forward by the administration. But during Mr. Cleveland's two incumbencies Messrs Hendricks and Stevenson have represented, not merely hostile factions, but principles and interests from which he was sun-dered by a gulf quite as great as that which divided him from his normal party foes. Mr. Sewall would make a colorless Vice-President, and we do not see how he could succeed Mr. Bryan in the White House would travel Mr. Bryan's path only with extreme reluctance and under duress. Mr. Watson would be a more startling, more attractive, and more dangerous figure, for if he got the chance he would last the nation with a whip of scorpions, while Bryan would be content with the torture of ordinary things.—From "The Three Vice-Presidential Candidates and What They Represent," by Theodore Roosevelt, in September Review of Reviews.

**Democratic Convention.**

The Democratic Executive Committee in each precinct, in the County of Swain, are hereby requested to hold and conduct primary elections in their respective precincts on Saturday the 5th day of Sept. And in the event of the failure of all being present, then such member or members of the Committee as may be present shall conduct same under the rules and regulations herein prescribed.

The candidates for the various offices—to wit: Representative, Sheriff, Register of Deeds, Treasurer, Sewveyor, Coroner, 3 County Commissioners, 3 Justices of the Peace for each Township and Constables, 5 Members Executive Committee for each voting precinct, shall be voted for on one ballot. The ballots may be written or printed with the name of the office above the name of the Candidate voted for.

All Democrats, and all those who pledge themselves to vote the County Democratic ticket in the November Election shall be entitled to vote in the primaries.

The judges shall see that those entitled to vote shall cast but one ballot. A clerk shall be appointed and shall keep a record of those voting.

Which record shall accompany the number of certified votes cast for the respective candidates, this to be determined by a count by the Judges at the close of balloting which certified copy shall be sent in person by delegates appointed by the various precincts, to a County Convention to be held in the Court House at Bryson City at 1 o'clock (Central time) Monday Sept. 7th 1896.

The delegation from each precinct shall consist of not more than five delegates and five alternates from each precinct.

In the nominating convention a majority of the electoral vote shall nominate—parties living in the boundaries of the new precincts—shall vote in the primaries at their old voting precinct to avoid confusion.

I recommend that the Executive Committee that are elected at the primary be appointed delegates to the Convention, so that they may organize and elect their County Chairman for the ensuing two years.
