### 34th Senatorial Convention

Owing to our inability to be pre-  
sent at the senatorial convention of  
this district, in order to give our  
readers the benefit of a full report  
thereof, we clip from our esteem-  
ed Contemporary, The Brevard Hus-  
tler the following:

"A convention of democratic dele-  
gates of the 34th Senatorial dis-  
trict was held at the Court House  
in this city pursuant to call of  
Chairman of the Executive Com-  
mittee, on Thursday August 27.

All the counties except Swain  
were represented by respectable dele-  
gations, and many citizens from adja-  
cent sections were present to wit-  
ness and approve the deliberations  
and decrees. The result was a large  
and enthusiastic gathering of the  
"unterrified" and a good old demo-  
cratic love feast.

In the absence of Chairman  
Hampton, A. E. Posey esq., of Hen-  
derson, called the convention to or-  
der and named Coleman Cowan, of  
Jackson, for temporary chairman  
and members of the democratic  
press present as temporary secreta-  
ries. The motion prevailed. On tak-  
ing the chair Mr. Cowan thanked  
the convention for the honor confer-  
red upon him and made a ring-  
ing speech in defence of democracy,  
pledging the individual support of  
Jackson county depositors to the  
man the convention would name  
as the standard bearer in this cam-  
paign. His address was timely, to  
the point and heartily received. In  
closing he said: "The towering peaks  
which divide us geographically will  
only serve to unite us in the fight  
against plutocracy and old Jackson  
will come up with 500 majority for  
the choice of this convention."

The convention was then declared  
formally open for the transaction  
of business. All counties represent-  
ed answered promptly with no con-  
test, where upon W. A. Gash moved  
that organization be made per-  
manent and that all delegates pre-  
sent be reorganized in the delibera-  
tions of the convention, which was  
carried without a dissenting voice.

Nominations were next declared  
in order and roll call of counties  
was proceeded with, each being re-  
quested to present the choice of their  
people. Henderson was called first  
and M. S. Farmer nominated Al-  
burt Cannon, whom he said would  
lead the hosts to victory. Thomas  
Wilson of Jackson, seconded the  
nomination of Mr. Cannon, as did  
W. A. Gash of Transylvania, who  
also moved that it be made by ac-  
clamation. The motion prevailed  
and the chair so declared. A. E.  
Posey, Thos Wilson and W. A. Gash  
were appointed to notify the nomi-  
nee of the convention.

T. J. Riskman, of Henderson, of-  
fered the following resolution  
which was unanimously adopted:  
"Resolve that this convention must  
heartily endorse the platform and candidates  
of the democratic party State and Nation-  
al, Hon. W. J. Bryan for President and  
Cyrus F. Watson for Governor, together  
with the entire State and National tickets;  
and that the members of the said conven-  
tion pledge them their undivided support."

The following were elected mem-  
bers of the Executive Committee  
for the ensuing two years: A. E.  
Posey, of Henderson, Coleman Cow-  
an, of Jackson, R. L. Leatherwood  
of Swain and J. A. Forsythe of  
Transylvania.

The committee on notification  
then escorted Mr. Cannon to the  
stand, where he made a elegant,  
eloquent and highly pleasing speech  
and he stood squarely on the Chi-  
cago platform and especially en-  
dorsed the financial plank. He an-  
nounced his readiness to meet his  
opponent and assure his friends  
that a democratic banner would  
never trail in the dust while in his  
hands."

**FROM MURPHY.**

Miss Florence Haines, of Florence  
S. C., who has been the guest of Mrs.  
S. A. Gregg the past month, will go  
South this week.

The new chandelier in the Pres-  
byterian church is quite handsome.

The special services at the Pres-  
byterian church, conducted by Rev.  
Mr. Cochran, will be concluded to-  
night. Rev. Dr. Campbell preached  
last night. This morning at 10 o'clock  
Rev. Mr. Barker will preach, after  
which the organization will be per-  
fected and officers elected. Tonight

back. Judge Russell made a lengthy  
speech, but did not seem to have  
received that inspiration which usu-  
ally follows such an ovation as was  
given him by a splendid looking  
crowd of well dressed and thrifty  
tillers of the soil. In fact, our farm-  
ers know about as much on the fi-  
nancial question as the speakers. If  
however, they were able to enlight-  
en us on that line they failed to do  
so. They made mild talks, in no  
way abusive, and there was less  
cheering than we ever witnessed at  
any political speaking. A few ex-  
treme men were disappointed. We  
had the pleasure of travelling with  
them to Andrews. They are pleas-  
ant and intelligent gentlemen, but  
they do not seem sanguine over  
the election of McKinley, or at least  
they were not enthused as is usual  
on such occasions.
