Most of the races in Saturday's Democratic primary contests in Swain county were pretty close, with about a two-thirds vote of the county being cast when 1840 of a possible 2800 votes in the county being cast in the sheriff's race which was the highest number cast. The bank sold \$5,943.75 of the total for May. The last week in May the bank and the Bryson postoffice each sold \$750.00 in bonds.

INDUSTRIAL WORKERS BEING EXAMINED BY STATE PHYSICIANS

The Division of Industrial Hygiene ous, under the direction of Dr. J. A. Winstead, was in Bryson City the first part of the week.

Dr. Winstead, assisted by Dr. P. Spearer, of the Federal Bureau of workers of the mines and other industries in the vicinity who are exposed to the dust hazard. The dusts tac and copper mines along with many of the men working at the Fontana Dam are exposed make these physical examinations at regular intervals necessary for prevention of tuberculosis and silicosis.
