
Mr. Philip E. Brintnall stated that the local ration board-Mr. Oscar Martin, chairman; Orville Calhoun, and W. T. Jenkins-was very much interested in seeing that Swain county families obtained an ample amount of sugar for canning, and that each family could obtain their purchasing certificate without having to travel too far from home.

The local ration board stated, according to Mr. Brintnall, that each 20 pounds of sugar for each member includes the amount of sugar rationed for canning in the first two regstrations for canning sugar.


