

REGULATIONS

The office of defense transportation has set-up certain requirements for operation of school buses that must be complied with if gasoline and repair parts are to be obtained in the future operation of our buses.

All stops are to spaced on school bus route sone-fourth mile apart mileage must be curtailed in some manner as to get only within one and one-half miles of children living at the end of routes, etc.

Bus routes in the county are now being re-worked in order to comply with these requirements. This ruling will not affect transportation in the county to a great extent. A number of buses are being pulled back from the end of routes to comply with the one and one-half mile limit, and numerous stops are being eliminated.

County school officials hope that the public will understand that it is not their desire to curtail transpor ation in any way, but that they are being forced to comply with this Federal Government regulation. They hope further that the public will understand that this is only another of the sacrifices we must all make as a
