Congressman Webb Is First Of
State Delegation In Capital.

Washington, Nov. 26.—Con-
gressman Yates Webb, who re-
ached Washington Saturday, said
he never felt better in all his
life and he looks the part. Mr.
Webb is the first member of Con-
gress from the State to put in
his appearance in Washington
for the session of Congress which
opens December 2.

The early arrival of the popu-
lar ninth district Congressman is
accounted for because of the led-
ing part which Mr. Webb has
taken in the Archabald impeach-
ment trial, which will again be
brought before the Senate Decem-
ber 5. Webb is vice chairman of
the House managers and will
make the principal speech in be-
half of the House when the im-
peachment charges are present-
ed to the Senate.

Of course Mr. Webb was pleas-
ed over the result of the election.
He believes the President elect
is going to make an excellent
Chief Executive of all the peo-
ple and when his four year term
as president expires the people
will want many more Democratic
administrations. Webb's dis-
trict give him the largest major-
ity of any district in the State.

Speaking of the possibility of
Republicans filling third and
fourth class postoffices, recently
put under the civil service by an
executive order issued by Presi-
dent Taft, Mr. Webb said he
was of the opinion that Presi-
dent Wilson would suspend this
order and put Democrats in
these offices. There are about
35,000 or 40,000 postoffices of this
class in the United States and
nearly every Democrat and not a
few Republicans believe Mr.
Taft's motive in placing these
men and women under the civil
service was to pay political debts.
Hence, Mr. Webb thinks they
should be turned out and Demo-
crats allowed to fill the vacancies.

Mr. Webb has quite a number
of bills which he intends to press
for passage during the coming
session of Congress, chief of
which, perhaps, is the Webb
liquor bill, which is intended to
prohibit the shipment of "booze"
into prohibition territory when it
is intended for illegal sale. The
bill simply gives the authorities
power to seize such "wet goods"
when it is believed it is to be
used for illegal purposes. In
other words, Mr. Webb's bill is
just as strong as the State pro-
hibition laws and just as strong
as the Constitution of the United
States will support.

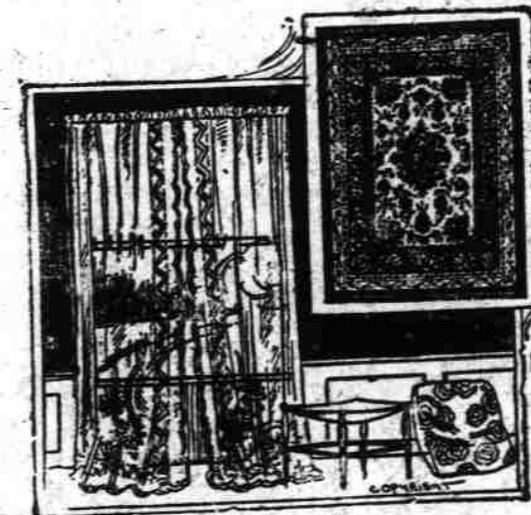
