Wilcox, Register of Deeds, receive \$200.00 for Cross Index. Motion failed. Allowance for computing Tax reduced to \$10.00, and \$16.00 allowed for Stationery. Then the proceedings were approved.

The following business was then transacted to-wit: B. F. Duchan elected Constable in Township, No. 8. Ordered that W. L. Rodes and D. C. Campbell be allowed \$19.56 for building or repairing Bridge. That Betsey Barber be released from double Tax for 1877. That Capt. J. D. McIver and W. R. Mose be released of 63 cents State and 61 cents County Tax on land improperly valued in 1877. That S. Caddell be released from 75 cents improperly charged on land for the year 1877, and that J. J. Wicker, Sheriff, refund the same to said Caddell. That Mrs. Hill and Leslie be released from paying Tax on \$5000 improperly charged. Amount of Tax, State, \$19.00, County, \$18.50. That the County Treasurer pay J. R. Brown ten dollars for money paid Nichols & Gorman, for stationery we suppose.

Thomas Maness was appointed Overseer of Road from Seawell's Shop, to middle of Deep River, at Island Ford. Application was made by Joseph McKay, for relief. Laid over.

T. R. Harper made application, to be released of Poll Tax. Laid over.

K. H. Worthy released from land tax, not regular.

Allowed W. K. Nunnery, \$100 each for Nancy Teague, John A. Shaw and Emily Cheek, Lunatics he cared for during the year 1877.

That J. A. Worthy, Commissioners' Attorney, be paid balance of his salary. Edward Fields' account allowed \$5.00. Bedford Salmon released of Poll Tax, being over age.

D. M. Blue was released of 75 cents Tax, overcharged.

Ordered that H. W. Spinks be released from double Tax for 1877, and pay only the regular Tax.

One hundred dollars each, was allowed Elizabeth Ward and Jane Phillips, Lunatics, for last year's maintenance.
